- 1. The bulletin article highlighting the importance of Christian fellowship the concluding questions: Are you meeting frequently with the people of God? Are you meeting with the intention to fellowship?
- The chairman and our deacon, Ken, shared his and fellow deacon Lye Heng's burden of making full use of the Lord's Day for Christian fellowship.
- 3. A group of parents gathered in the sanctuary from 12 noon to listen and discuss plans for a new approach to our Junior & Teens' Fellowship.

I'm reminded of Demas, whom the Apostle Paul described, in rather haunting terms, as having "forsaken him" and the ministry because he "loved this present world" (2 Tim 4:10).

Whether Demas had abandoned Christ altogether, we do not know. What is clear is that the brief reference to Demas was a warning for us to pursue Christ and church much more seriously.

One reason why we are not interested in deeper fellowship is because we love this world more. Does this describe you?

Last Sunday's Parents' Meeting

I was 'appointed' the spokesperson at last Sunday's parents' gathering. As I prepared what to share, the hymn "Have You Counted the Cost?" came to mind, which we sang.

The hymn calls us to evaluate our actual commitment to God. How much time do we spend with God and God's people

versus time spent on ourselves and our pleasurable pursuits?

The writer describes our pursuit as one of "hurry[ing] along with the pleasuremad throng".

Make no mistake: even our hard slogs at work to earn a living for our and our children's pursuits are 'pleasureseeking'. As King Solomon calls it, they are vanity (Ps 127:2).

What Is Our Greatest Fear for Our Children?

There would be full consensus on the answer. The answer would have to be: "that they reject Christ and do not get to spend eternity with us in heaven".

But the follow-up question would be: "What are we doing to ensure that the fear isn't realized?" This is where it gets tricky.

Can our regular shuttling of our kids (to sports, tuition, music, etc.) to the exclusion of fellowship with God's people be potentially nudging them closer to hell?

I do not mean to cause offense but I do mean to cause alarm if this may indeed be the case.

I would challenge us to think how we could be complicit in "barter[ing] our hope of eternity's morn for a moment of joy at the most", as the hymn-writer notes. Many of us, sadly, may be doing just that.

When we emphasize earthly pursuits, to our children, by giving significantly more time and effort to them, we invariably neglect time with God's people. It is a zero sum outcome.

Let us not rationalize the lack of focus on the things of God. Remember that God is not mocked and the consequences are severe.

How can we do good to those in the household of faith (Gal 6:10) when we don't even spend time in fellowship, serving with and beside our brethren?

Value of Time

Everyone complains they only have 24 hours a day. This isn't really true.

Yes, much of our time is taken up by duties, obligations, and problems that we cannot shirk from. This is simply our lot in life, and we are kept very busy.

However, the majority of us have 'discretionary time' - time which we can use in almost any way we please.

This valuable time is often squandered away deriving pleasure for ourselves in recreation, extended rest, or shopping.

But the time ought to be spent in spiritual matters - prayer, Scripture, witnessing, works of mercy, Christian service and fellowship.

As a matter of fact, this is what the early Christians did as recorded in Acts 2:44-47 so that we may emulate.

Do we as parents make bad decisions on how we spend our discretionary time? Do we pass on the same to our children? We do this on weekdays, but it extends even to the Lord's Day, a day set apart for worship and fellowship. Are we ever ready to skip church because other activities take precedence? What message does this send to our children? Is God disposable that we can worship him according to our timing? We are dicing with eternal death!

Fellowship and Let Your Children Fellowship

Our church is pressing on to revitalize our fellowship groups, starting with the teens and then working our way down to the younger children.

There was also a call for us all to remain behind for fellowship.

Last week's meeting was intended for all of us to listen to some proposals for new Teens' and Junior Fellowship structure.

We ought to think seriously about drawing a line in the sand (a metaphor from the hymn) from this year onwards.

Let us do what we can – while we still can – to imbue in us and our children a deep sense of love for the Lord and His church.

Let us grab every opportunity we can to learn, to worship and to fellowship because the cost is too great otherwise.

As the final stanza of the hymn pleads:

"Won't you come and be healed, won't you whisper, I yield - I have counted, I have counted the cost." ~ Terence Lee

Q. 45. How doth Christ execute the office of a king?

It Is Hard for You to Kick Against the Pricks Jonah 1:17-2:10

Ancient farmers used an ox prick to steer the ox. The ox would rebel and kick the prick, hurting itself. Defiance doesn't pay. As Christians, God steers lovingly. But when we rebel, he will use all means to restore us. Jonah defied, God used all means to restore him.

- 1. God Brought About Jonah's Desperation.
 - a. God is sovereign and powerful.
 - b. His means can be very extreme.
 - c. God used chastisement to bring forth desperation.
- 2. God Brought About Jonah's Contrition.
 - a. Jonah's contrition was marked by repentance.
 - b. Jonah's contrition was marked by faith.
 - c. Jonah's contrition was marked by a desire to worship.
- 3. God Brought About Jonah's Salvation.
 - a. God is in charge of salvation.
 - b. God alone is in charge of salvation.

Christ saved sinners by dying so that we can be rescued from our defiance. He faced despair to rescue us from ours. He went into the tomb, that we can be saved from ours. He went through extreme despair for us.

Questions for Reflection:

- 1. How defiant are you against God?
- 2. How defiant should you be against God as a Christian who has been rescued from defiance? Could your defiance be a result of desiring to pursue your own happiness apart from God?
- 3. How will your defiance end?
