Serving the Lord with Joy

Introduction

To serve the Lord is a marvelous privilege. And to serve the Lord in the church and to serve his people should be a great joy.

Psalm 100:2 says, "Serve the LORD with gladness." It is a command to serve God with joy. Also, joy makes service all the more worthwhile.

But how do we have joy in service? Joy comes when we have right thinking, right motives, and right heart for service.

Paul was especially joyful in his service - despite the issues that cropped up in his ministry, he was joyful.

He said in Philippians 4:4 - "Rejoice in the Lord always, and again I say, rejoice!"

Joyful Service - Fruit of Knowing God's Providence

Joy comes when we understand God's providence - no matter what the circumstances - God is working. When Paul wrote those words in Philippians 4:4, there were two issues which were going on.

Firstly, Paul was imprisoned because he preached the gospel. Yet he was able to rejoice because he knew that whatever circumstances he was in, it had worked out "unto the furtherance of the gospel" (Philippians 1:12).

Because of his imprisonment, his prison guards were saved.

Secondly, there were problems in the Philippian church between 2 co-workers - Euodias and Syntyche. They were at odds (Philippians 4:2). But he was able to rejoice because this was an opportunity for the other brethren in the church to help them towards reconciliation (Philippians 4:3).

Joy in service comes not in the absence of problems; but it comes when we see God working through the problems. They become opportunities for us to live the gospel.

Joyful Service - Fruit of Serving Correctly

Joy comes when we are serving with the right motives. Why did Paul serve? He served out of obedience to God. Romans 1:9 - "For God is my witness, whom I serve with my spirit."

Paul did not serve because it was simply a good idea to serve; neither did he serve because others expected him to serve - rather, God was his motivation for service. He served with his spirit - all that was in him.

Do we serve people for people's sake alone? No. Do we serve the church for the church's sake alone? No. We serve because we are passionately serving God.

We know that Paul served God because of the fruits of his labor. In the book of Romans, he expressed his thanks to God for the Roman Christians.

Romans 1:8 - "First, I thank my God through Jesus Christ for you all, that your faith is spoken of throughout the whole world."

Paul had a thankful heart. And this was interesting because at the time of his writing, Paul was in Corinth where the Jews were plotting to kill him!

But he was thankful nevertheless! Unless we are thankful, we can easily dwell on the negative, and lose our joy in service.

Joyful Service - Supported by Prayer

Romans 1:9 say, "For God is my witness, whom I serve with my spirit in the gospel of his Son, that without

ceasing I make mention of you always in my prayers."

Paul was consumed with praying for the saints. If he was serving God, and if it was God's work to advance the church, it is no surprise he resorted unceasingly to prayer!

This also shows that a God-derived burden is important. And this prayerful burden led to a result. It led to an eager spirit to serve God's people.

Joyful Service - Proven by Love for People

So how did Paul exhibit his joyful, thankful, prayerful service to God? He loved the saints!

Romans 1:11 - "For I long to see you, that I may impart unto you some spiritual gift, to the end ye may be established."

Paul wanted to see the people established. He wanted to see the people grow in grace and in the gospel (Romans 1:12).

Joyful Service - Energized by the Gospel

God is building his church. It will be wondrous one day. How God does that is by the gospel - that is the foundation on which Christ would build the church (Matthew 16:18).

Romans 1:15 says, "So, as much as in me is, I am ready to preach the gospel to you that are at Rome also."

The gospel is the power of God for the salvation - justification, sanctification, glorification - complete transformation of everyone that believes (Romans 1:16).

Conclusion

Why is there joy in service? Why is there hope in God for the church? Because the gospel transforms the church.

Despite Paul's imprisonment and the two quarreling women, there was an opportunity for the gospel. Joy.

We do not serve ourselves, our purposes, nor the purposes of others - we serve God with our spirit. Joy.

Because God is at work to redeem his people to himself and to transform the church, we pray and sue God for his favor. Joy.

Because we know that God is at work in people, we are eager to serve people, to see them established. Joy.

And because we know that God can change lives through the gospel, we labor even more that the gospel would be evident in us. Joy.

As we serve God, may we labor to find that joy. It can only come from informed, God-motivated, prayerful, loving, and gospel-oriented service.

Rejoicing for the Kingdom Nehemiah 12:27-47

After the people were revived, did they continue to remain faithful to God in all the vows that they made? No. Nehemiah was absent for many years and the people once again regressed into their old sins. When the cat's away, the mice will play. There will always be continual problems in kingdom building.

- 1. Our Broken Promises and Spiritual Deterioration
 - a. They broke their resolve to be separate
 - b. They broke their resolve to worship God
 - c. The broke their resolve to love Christ and His Day
 - d. The broke their resolve not to marry unbelievers
- 2. The Necessary Continual Correction
 - a. Reliance
 - b. Removal
 - c. Reproof
 - d. Regulation
 - e. Retribution

Why are there problems in church growth? It is because we do not listen to the Spirit. Christ may be in heaven, but his Spirit is still with his church. When we fail to heed the Spirit, there will be continual problems. But we must remember that Christ will always build his kingdom.

Questions for Reflection:

- The Jews learn that their commitment to remain separate from pagans needs to extend beyond simply avoiding intermarriage. Have you ever repented of a sin only to find that the problem went deeper than you first thought? Why are we sometimes slow to understand the depth of our sin?
- 2. Nehemiah goes to dramatic lengths to restore order. What do you personally think of his actions? Are they eccentric? Extreme? Do you think he is justified in acting this way? Why or why not? If we were to see Nehemiah as a type of Christ, how would this help in your answer?
- 3. Why does Nehemiah keep asking God to "remember me?" How much should we fear that we may do or think sinfully in trying to do right? Why?
