Hymns of Grace and Glory

Our church has recently obtained 250 copies of the hymnal - *Hymns of Grace and Glory.*

With 740 hymns and more than 80 Psalms from the Scottish Psalter, *Hymns of Grace and Glory* continues the tradition of beautiful sacred music that has characterized the Protestant movement since the time of the Reformation.

Why a New Hymnal?

There are many reasons why a church would change her hymnal.

One such reason is copyright.

Many B-P churches have historically used *Revival Hymns and Choruses.* However, it flouts the law in 2 ways.

Firstly, by not obtaining permission to reprint copyrighted hymns it robs hymnodists of their rightful earnings.

Secondly, by not obtaining permission to reprint the typesets from various hymnals, it is merely a photocopied reproduction.

This is why Covenant Church, from its onset, had not used *Revival Hymns and Choruses.*

We have used *Great Hymns of the Faith*, which if you look carefully at the typeset, is the basis for most of the hymns in *Revival Hymns and Choruses*.

But since copyright is not the issue, why then have we changed our hymnal?

Doctrine

While *Great Hymns of the Faith* has served us well, many of its hymns are Arminian in theology.

These same hymns in the new hymnal have been edited. But we need not criticize the former hymnal, in order to promote the new. One of the commendations of the new hymnal is its doctrinal corrections and correctness.

In the hymn *And Can It Be*, Charles Wesley, though indebted to him we are, incorrectly wrote that "Christ emptied himself of all but love."

Christ of course did not empty himself of all but love. Sounds sentimental and poetic, but it's wrong.

The new hymnal has edited that to read "humbled himself in matchless love." This preserves the doctrine of Christ's kenosis.

Another of the commendations is its inclusion of lesser known, but valuable Reformed hymns.

Included in this hymnal are a number of hymns by Horatius Bonar and Robert Murray M'Cheyne, ministers of the Free Church of Scotland.

"Not What These Hands Have Done" and "When This Passing World Is Done" are wonderful hymns contributed by godly men.

There is even a hymn by John Calvin. "Before the Throne of God Above" which has been rediscovered by the Church today, is also included.

Similarly, the new hymnal has included lesser known, but important stanzas of well-known hymns.

"The Church's One Foundation" in many hymnals often misses one important stanza, included in this hymnal - "Tho' with a scornful wonder men see her sore oppressed, by schisms rent asunder, by heresies distressed, yet saints their watch are keeping, their cry goes up "How long?" And soon the night of weeping shall be the morn of song."

New Hymns and New Tunes

We are incalculably indebted to godly men and women throughout the

centuries whom the Lord has used to give us a deeper devotion to our God, through a greater knowledge of His person, His work, and His word.

However, hymn writing didn't stop in the 19th century. Music for worship has continued to be written well into this century.

Many however, fall far short of the depth, reverence, and biblical content required for praise of an infinitely holy and wise God.

This hymnal incorporates many of the finer new hymns that have been written.

Towards Presbytery

This hymnal was also obtained in part because our sister church, Hope Bible-Presbyterian Church, has also obtained it. They purchased 500 copies!

They just moved into their new church building last week. New church, new hymnal. We rejoice together with them.

While it is not altogether necessary, it is good and pleasant that churches working towards the same goal of Presbytery can have the same Presbyterian hymnal.

Why a Hymnal?

Why is there even a need for a hymnal?

Churches are using the projector more and more for their worship. There is nothing wrong with this - it is merely a circumstance.

However, one beneficial reason for a hymnal is theology. Next to the Bible

and the teaching ministry, what the church sings determines her theology.

And what the church sings will preserve her theology. Having a good hymnal often prevents a church from moving from her theological moorings, because she may not readily add to her repertoire of songs.

About the Editor

The editor of the hymnal is Joan Pinkston. She is the pianist at Faith Free Presbyterian Church in Greenville, North Carolina, and a professor of music theory, hymn improvisation, orchestration and choral composition at Bob Jones University.

Many of her former students, like Dan Forrest, are currently involved in writing, publishing, and performing sacred music.

The hymnal includes 70 of her own tunes she has written to accompany old and new hymns.

 - b. Belief
 - c. Signs today

How do we change the world? Not by relying on the world and its philosophies. But we rely on God working through us when we pray and when we are purified. Such a changed life will be a powerful sign to others of the gospel truth. And in turn this will change the world.

Questions for Reflection:

- 1 Do you agree it is easier to rely on techniques and skill sets to try to change the world for Christ rather than a changed and holy life? Why is that?
- 2 If the power of God in the church and believers' lives terrifies and scares unbelievers, shouldn't the church be more relevant and welcoming by being less demanding when it comes to the standard of holiness?
