The Olive Tree and Its Spiritual Significance

The Olive Tree Described in the Bible

The olive tree was created on the third day of Creation when God separated the waters and the dry lands and created all the trees and plants (Genesis 1:9–13).

It is interesting to note, that this was before the sun and the moon were created. These trees basked in the glory and light of God.

But the olive tree was first mentioned after the Flood. When Noah sent out the dove from the ark, it returned with an olive leaf.

"And the dove came in to him in the evening; and, lo, in her mouth was an olive leaf pluckt off..." (Genesis 8:11).

This shows us that out of the ravage of the flood, one of the first trees to grow was the olive tree.

It was hardy plant and a useful plant. When Israel was about to conquer Canaan, God told them that the land they would inherit would be filled with good things - including the olive tree.

"And it shall be, when the LORD thy God shall have brought thee into the land which he sware unto thy fathers...to give thee great and goodly cities, which thou buildedst not, and houses full of all good things, which thou filledst not, and wells digged, which thou diggedst not, vineyards and olive trees, which thou plantedst not..." (Deuteronomy 6:10-11).

And when the tribes settled in Canaan, the tribe of Asher received, as her inheritance, the foothills of the Galilean mountains - a land filled with olive groves.

"Let Asher be blessed with children; let him be acceptable to his brethren, and let him dip his foot in oil." (Deuteronomy 33:24).

This shows that the olive tree was prized for his fruitfulness. The wood, leaves, fruit, and oil were used to sustain the people.

So precious and valuable were the trees and oil, that King David appointed special servants to take care of them - these were those used in the worship of God at the temple.

"And over the olive trees and the sycomore trees that were in the low plains was Baalhanan the Gederite: and over the cellars of oil was Joash." (1 Chronicles 27:28).

So useful and valuable was the tree that Israel herself was described as an olive tree - insofar as she was faithful to God.

"The LORD called thy name, A green olive tree, fair, and of goodly fruit..." (Jeremiah 11:16).

The Olive Tree Symbolizes God's People
This symbolic use of the olive tree to refer to God's covenant people - those with whom God had entered a relationship - was used in the Bible.

In the Old Testament, it was Israel (Jeremiah 11:16) - God's olive tree. God entered into a relationship with no other people.

But how could the Gentiles be part of that people? Only by being grafted into that one tree.

Gentiles were described as being wild olive branches - uncultivated and outside of God's garden - but by faith, they could be grafted into that one tree. They were brought from afar off into God's garden and grafted into his tree.

"And if some of the branches be broken off, and thou, being a wild olive tree, wert graffed in among them, and with them partakest of the root and fatness of the olive tree...and thou staidest by faith" (Romans 11:17,20).

But just as Gentiles could be made part of the people of God by faith, Israel because of unbelief - was cast aside from being the people of God.

"Well; because of unbelief they were broken off, and thou standest by faith..." (Romans 11:20).

Being part of God's true people is not by genetics but by faith.

But the Bible tells us that Israel will not disbelieve forever. There will be one day when they will believe in Jesus. And when that happens, they will be regrafted into the olive tree.

"And they also, if they abide not still in unbelief, shall be graffed in: for God is able to graff them in again. For if thou wert cut out of the olive tree which is wild by nature, and wert graffed contrary to nature into a good olive tree: how much more shall these, which be the natural branches, be graffed into their own olive tree?" (Romans 11:23-24).

Jesus and the Olive Tree

Jesus came to save his people. And thus we would expect a great connection between Jesus and the olive tree. He taught about it, used it in his parables, and had much spiritual connection with it.

In order to purchase a people for himself - which were not his people - Jesus had to suffer.

Jesus suffered at Gethsemane. The name literally means "olive press" and it

was a garden or a grove filled with olives at the Mount of Olives.

There, he was pressed in the spirit and shed great drops of blood (Matthew 26:36, Mark 14:32), as he struggled to overcome his will to live to submit to his father's will for him to die.

Presumably in the same garden, or another at the Mount of Olives, he was betrayed by Judas (John 18:1).

Here, years before, at the Mount of Olives, David himself wept sore - after having been betrayed by Ahitophel and his son Absalom.

Jesus also suffered and died at Golgotha - which is described in Hebrews 13:12-13. According to Levitical law, the sin offering for the Day of Atonement was burned outside the camp.

This was done at the Mount of Olives which was east of the city. This was the place where the red heifer was prepared for the purification of God's people (Leviticus 4:12, Ezekiel 43:21).

After Jesus suffered, was crucified, was buried, and resurrected; he ascended from the Mount of Olives after he gave his commission to his disciples to extend and establish the kingdom (Acts 1:9,12).

And on this mount he will descend at his Second Coming, where he will conquer the world and rule with his people (Acts 1:11, Zechariah 14:4).
